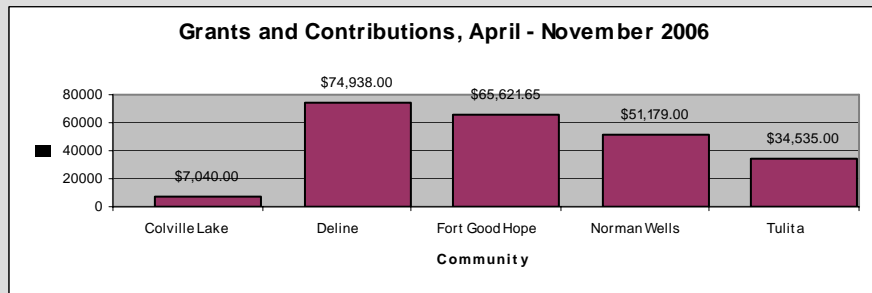
Our Vision:

Meet the Sahtu ITI team:

Michael Sanagan, Regional Superintendent michael_sanagan@gov.nt.ca

Last November Michael arrived in Norman Wells from Iqaluit. He previously worked for the GNWT and transferred over to the Nunavut Government in 1999, when he became the Superintendent in the Kitikmeot Region.

Prior to permanently moving to the North in 1993, Michael worked in the venture development sector of a major bank and moved to Ottawa where he worked in credit management section of the Business Development Bank of Canada.

Michael's role is to facilitate and support ITI staff in continued efforts to provide quality services and programs to clients. His focus is to co-ordinate the operations of the office and constantly reviews progress to ensure the regional economy benefits from departmental support.



Support for Communities:

So far this year, regional Trade & Investment staff have made 17 visits to Sahtu communities, and have delivered workshops in every community on *ITI Programs and Services* and *Proposal Writing*. Small Business Financial Management workshops and a session on Joint Ventures were also offered this fall by expert consultants and facilitated by ITI.

Support for Artists

The Sahtu has a wealth of talented artists and craftspeople. To support this sector of the economy, ITI has two funding programs for materials and supplies used to create artwork or for sale: Grants for Small Business, and BDF Schedule I – Raw Materials for Traditional Arts & Fine Crafts. Last year, artists and crafters received \$58,524 through these programs.

Frank has been a resident of Norman Wells for the past 25 years, and has resided in the North for over 40 years. He has previous work experience with Federal and Territorial governments, and associated work with oil and gas exploration companies. He was here during the Norman Wells expansion and pipeline projects in the early 1980's. Frank has served in numerous capacities in several northern communities as an elected representative for municipal governments.

The title of Frank's position may be a bit confusing, as he also works with mineral exploration companies and the Mackenzie Gas project, planning for the proposed Mackenzie Gas Pipeline. Frank is available to assist and advise community groups and governments, companies, industry, big and small business. He also works with individuals to help them identify specific training and employment opportunities in the region. In Frank's government role as liaison between industry and the people of the Sahtu, he helps to ensure everyone understands the issues and advises how they can benefit from non-renewable resource development.

3. Establish compatibility – match the program mandates of each partner
4. Get the details right – key points for the partnership roles, who will do what, when and how

The Back Page

Exploration in Our Region – by Frank Pope

This winter will see limited exploration for oil and gas in the region. Talisman Energy are planning a seismic data gathering program in the Deline District around Great Bear Lake, and Kodiak Petroleum are planning a small seismic program in the Grandview Hills area north of Fort Good Hope, close to Little Chicago. Contracts will be awarded fairly soon for the work on these projects and I anticipate northern and local businesses gaining many of the available opportunities as well as having local people filling a high percentage of the jobs.

British Gas Canada are planning to conduct a helicopter supported seismic program in the Kasho Got'ine District in close proximity to Fort Good Hope in early summer next year. Petro-Canada also hope to undertake considerable work during 2007/08 in the Kahso Got'ine District around Colville Lake, as do Husky Energy in the Tulita District.

Mackenzie Gas Project are planning to conduct further geotechnical work on the proposed pipeline right of way, taking soil samples, conducting surveys for facility sites and locating granular material they will require once the project proceeds. EOS Pipelines, in partnership with Mackay Range Development Corporation of Tulita, will be prime contractors for the work. Several other contracts have been awarded to local businesses and quite a few people should gain employment.

Mineral activities continue to be very heavy in the region, several companies worked in the Mackenzie Mountains last summer including Kaska Minerals, Eagle Plains Resources and Pacifica who plan to reopen a mine on the NWT/Yukon border in the Howards Pass area. Diamondex continue exploration in several parts of the Sahtu, and mineral indicators seem to be fairly positive. Patrician Diamonds continue to explore an area northeast of Norman Wells and are currently raising capital for a planned drilling program next spring and summer. Pure Gold Minerals, earning in on properties licensed to DeBeers, continue to explore in the Colville Lake area. Sanatana Diamonds are working in the Kilekale Lake area north of Bear Lake and on properties south and south east of Colville Lake around Lac Belot and Lac DeBois. Several other companies also have prospecting and exploration interests in the Sahtu Region.

Capacity Building for Economic Developers in the Sahtu Region

A regional Community Economic Development workshop will be held **January 22 – 26, 2007**, in Norman Wells. Participants from all five Sahtu communities will have the opportunity to work together while gaining some insight into the work they do as community development practioners.

Minerals, Oil and Gas Information Workshops

Plans are in the works for ITI-led workshops in each of the Sahtu communities, during January, February and early March. These one-day workshops will introduce the basics of oil and gas exploration, explaining such operations as “seismic data collection” and “drilling methods.” The mineral component will explain the geology of the region, plus prospecting and exploration methods. Information on these workshops will be advertised in your communities in December. These sessions will be open to community leadership, the general public and school students. These sessions will be delivered by representatives from both industry and government.
