Marion Storm has lived in the Northwest Territories for eight years, settling in Fort Simpson with her husband, Dean for the past three years. Storm, originally from Thunder Bay ON, obtained her Honours Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree, Bachelor of Education, and Master of Education degree from Lakehead University. After teaching art for ten years she started her own school, Storm School of Art.

An unfortunate bout with cancer saw the demise of Storm School of Art. After chemo and radiation something inside Storm's 'core' changed. Suddenly the urgency of truly 'living' became of utmost importance. As a result she decided to embark on a soul's exploration, living and painting the Northwest Territories.

Storm's paintings follow her journey like reflections on water, bouncing off feelings morphing into surroundings. Her paintings mark passages from terror and fear at the diagnosis of cancer to celebration and joy of being cancer-free and alive, truly living and experiencing the magic of the Northwest Territories. Priscilla's Revenge Takes on Toronto



At the end of November, thanks to support from ITI and other members of the community, Yellowknife's own Priscilla's Revenge were able to perform live at one of the largest venues in Canada – Toronto's Rodger's Centre during the Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards (CAMA).

This blues-based band, comprised of Norman Glowach, Greg Nasogaluak and Blair Brezinski, put out their first album "Built for Speed" earlier this year to wild acclaim. It must have been great, as the all-original tunes earned the band CAMA nominations for Best Group or Duo of the Year, and Best Blues Album of the Year.

Up against some pretty stiff competition from over 400 entries, these talented guys were selected as the final three to be recognized in their categories and the band chosen to perform at this year's main stage show in Toronto's Rogers' Centre. While they didn't win, they did have an invaluable opportunity for band members to show their stuff and network with business and musical connections throughout the country and internationally.

Greg, Norm and Blair are certainly not newcomers on the music scene. Each of them were born here in the NWT and bring a long history of Northern music to the group.

Greg, originally from the Tuktoyaktuk area, was the first Inuvialuit person to perform on the main stage at these awards. In past years, his grandparents, Alex and Hope Gordon received Lifetime Achievement Awards for their contributions to Inuvialuit drumming and dancing in 1999. His father, William, also knows the big stage as he opened for Metallica during the Molson Rocks 1995 concert in Tuktoyaktuk.

Norman has worked with groups throughout the Northwest Territories producing albums and saving the North's audio heritage with his privately owned company, Spiritwalker Productions. He has personally been active in the music scene here for over 40 years. Blair Brezinski, bass player extraordinaire, has been a solid bottom end in more bands that we can list.

The guys were excited about the incredible opportunity not only to play their music to those tuning in, but to be able to network with industry representatives who were scouting out the next hot thing. "To have a chance like this to meet these folks face-to-face is everything," said Glowach. "It's not everyday you get an audience of 10,000 for your product."
