INCREASED FUNDING FOR THE ARTS

The Department of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) is dedicated to the arts and artists of the Northwest Territories. Through funding and other supports, assistance is given to existing artists, events and programs, and to help new initiatives get off the ground. With this aim, ECE has recently increased funding for the arts by \$500,000.

These new funds will help the GNWT address the priorities laid out in the Arts Strategy Action Plan II, tabled in spring 2007. These priorities include support for Northern performers in visual, performing, and cultural arts.

Existing programs and organizations that will receive more funding include the NWT Arts Council (\$49,000), the Support for Northern Performers Program (\$16,000), and the Northern Arts and Cultural Centre (\$80,000). Registered heritage centres will receive an additional \$100,000, and various cultural projects around the territory will be supplemented with a \$35,000 increase.

On top of these increases to existing projects, ECE has also introduced funding for two new areas. Northern theatre arts, with a focus on our territory's youth, will be funded for \$50,000. Emerging heritage centres, which are in the early stages of development, will also receive \$50,000.

Through these and other forms of support, ECE hopes to boost northern arts and culture to new heights. Artists, in all media, are indispensable parts of northern culture and ECE is proud to support them.

CBC is looking for creative and original projects that appeal to diverse audiences, reflect the region from which they originate and are attached to dynamic and experienced production teams. Applications can be submitted for development of a concept and should include a script, budget and financial plan and/or piloting.

Please note that drama series, MOWs, and feature scripts and pilots, kids and variety programs are normally developed by network departments. Your local CBC office may be able to provide direction, project review and forwarding to network departments.

Before submitting your proposal, it is strongly recommended that you familiarize yourself with the television landscape including the CBC schedule. Programs which are innovative, contemporary and relevant, with a clear narrative and storyline and a strong appeal to audiences will have the greatest chance of success. What's going on in the NWT Regions!



NORTH SLAVE/HEADQUARTERS REGION

The Staff from Headquarters (HQ) with the Arts and Fine Crafts Section of the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment (ITI) regularly hold information sessions and workshops in various communities within each region. In June, HQ staff held information sessions for members of the National Aboriginal Arts Administrators and Funders Gathering that took place in Fort Simpson, NT. In addition, an information session was also presented to NWT artists, at the Great Northern Arts Festival in Inuvik, NT in July 2008. Both sessions focused on the NWT Arts Branding Logo Program and the NWT Artists Database.

The North Slave region made financial contributions to the 2008 Summer Solstice Festival (www.solsticefestival.ca), as well as to the 2008 Folk on the Rocks music festival (www.folkontherocks.com).

DEHCHO REGION

Between June 23rd and 29th the Open Sky Creative Society (OSCS) brought artists from across Canada to Fort Simpson to exhibit their work for the first time ever in the OSC Gallery! OSCS welcomed Alan Lacovetsky (ceramicist and potter from Winnipeg, MB), Anna Torma (fibre artist from Baie Verte, NB) Diane Gonthier (fibre artist and quilter from Laurentides, QB, who specializes in felt work), France Trepanier (mixed media artist from Vancouver, BC, who specializes in beeswax vessels) and Lyn Fabio (artist from Whitehorse, who specializes in hog gut vessels). These artists showed their work in the Craftwork-Craftsmanship: National Guest Artist Exhibition.

Dehcho representation in the Exhibition included Lucy Simon of Jean Marie River (beadwork on traditional tanned moose-hide), Phoebe Punch of Trout Lake (spruce-root baskets) and Julia Tsetso (beadwork). The OSC Gallery is the very first artist run gallery in the Northwest Territories. The OSCS Board is so grateful for all the hard work Michael Blyth, Festival Coordinator/Artistic Director put into getting this project off the ground!

The Festival included a variety of regional artists (Louisa Moreau, Kari-Lyn Jumbo, Christine Rudolf, Tracy Brown, Brenda Allaire, Madison Pilling, Adele Hardisty, Mary Nayally, Dinah Anderson and Shona Barbour) in addition to the exhibiting artists, performers and musicians. Richard Van Camp returned for the second year in a row to MC the opening ceremony and as a presenter one evening and Skeena Rease of Vancouver charmed the audience with her stories, humour and wit. Musicians included the Brother-in-Law Band (Kakisa, NT), Lee Mandiville (Yellowknife, NT), Root Sellers (Whitehorse, YK), Mary Cox (Yellowknife, NT) and the young fiddlers who belong to the Kole Crook Fiddle Association. Following the Festival, OSCS hosted the 7th annual National Aboriginal Art Administrators and Funders Gathering (NAAAFG) for three days. Artists and art administrators from across the country met to network, to discuss their projects and share their stories.

South Slave Regional Staff provide assistance to artists in communities within the region, primarily through providing access to the Business Development Fund and Grants to Small Business programs.

SOUTH SLAVE REGION

The South Slave offices continue to work on arts and fine craft displays in prominent areas of the regional communities, with 2 more currently being established in Fort Smith.

The Northern Life Museum (NLM) held a moose-hide tanning workshop at Pine Lake this summer, which was funded through the Fort Smith office. The NLM continues to host workshops throughout the year. Staff are also busy assisting clients and the local communities through various marketing and promotional efforts to ensure all upcoming arts & cultural events are well received, advertised and promoted.



INUVIK REGION

This has been an extremely hectic summer for the entire Inuvik Region arts community. Artists, crafts people and musicians were front and centre throughout the region this summer and were instrumental in making all of our events a tremendous success. Aboriginal Day celebrations were held in Inuvik in conjunction with the Town of Inuvik's 50th Anniversary. ITI co-sponsored the annual Canadian Rural Revitalization Federation Convention in Inuvik and all three events ran simultaneously with the Arts Community being the centre of attention.

The Great Northern Arts festival (www.gnaf.org) was a rousing success again this year with some incredible displays by artisans from all three Territories and beyond. Again this year Artists in residence were able to create, display and sell their product right on site.

The Midway Lake and End of the Road Music festivals were very well attended again this year with plans already underway for next year.

SAHTU REGION

Antoine Mountain, Traditional Fine Arts Development Officer at the ITI Regional Sahtu office has been very busy this past summer working with artists in all of the surrounding Sahtu communities (Colville Lake, Deline, Fort Good Hope and Tulita). Antoine is an artist and was born and raised in Fort Good Hope, so he knows first-hand the challenges of producing art from a small isolated community.

In each of his workshops, Antoine has encouraged artists to realize the true definition of the arts and its place in a healthy community, and the role that artists perform for society as a whole. Artists also learned how to distinguish between two-dimensional works and the fine traditional arts and carving. He also discussed the materials and supplies required for each, and how to order them at affordable prices. Twelve of these artists participated in the Sahtu in the Arts event that took place in Yellowknife, NT in June 2008. It featured artists of the Sahtu Region through an art-sale, artists demonstrations and performances. Artists learned first-hand how to present themselves as professional artists and performers.

Mr. Mountain also took the time to give community school presentations speaking to students about his own career as an artist, starting from his earlier life on the land and on to the world in general. He introduced the idea of 'Art as an Education. This workshop identified post secondary schooling opportunities and funding and grants that are available to artists who want to further their education. Other workshop topics included, "Arts as a Business" and "How to form a Sahtu Artists Association".

In the next coming months the Sahtu Regional Office, in partnership with the Norman Wells Claimant Corporation, will be coordinating the creation of two large murals. The main incentive of this project is to encourage local youth to participate in the creation process of these murals. The murals will represent each of the Sahtu communities. The locations of these murals are still to be determined.

The Regional Office is also gearing up to kick off an 8-month campaign to promote individual accomplished Sahtu artists. Each month, an artist or group will be featured in local newspapers such as the News North.

In addition to this, they are working on an airport display project. Artwork from each of the Sahtu communities will be purchased from artists and put on permanent display in the Norman Wells airport

NWT ARTS COUNCIL

The NWT Arts Council was established August 1985, as an advisory board to the GNWT. The mandate of the NWT Arts Council is to promote the arts in the Northwest Territories.

The Arts Council provides recommendations to the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) on financial awards for creative artistic projects in the visual, literary, media and performing arts. This council also provides recommendations on issues and policies associated with the arts and artists.

Five members are appointed to the NWT Arts Council by the Executive Council of the Government of the Northwest Territories for a term of two years.

Members are selected for their expertise and abilities in the arts from five regions of the Northwest Territories: South Slave, Inuvik, Deh Cho, Sahtu and North Slave.

Sonny MacDonald - Fort Smith Region

Ruth Wright - Inuvik Region

Lee Mandeville - North Slave Region

Julia Tsetso - Dehcho Region

Peggy Pouw -Sahtu Region

ECE administers the NWT Arts Council funding program for artistic projects, through the Community Programs Office, Division of Culture & Heritage.

Members meet once a year to review applications. The annual budget for financial contributions is \$355,000.

Applicants may be eligible for funding from the NWT Arts Council if:

- they have been a resident of the NWT for at least 2 years immediately prior to the deadline
- they are an emerging artist or an established artist
- they are a registered NWT organization with a mandate to enhance the arts
- their application is for a specific creative project

The deadline for applications is January 31 each year.

TAKE A KID TRAPPING PROGRAM:

Traditions Honored and Skills Passed On

During the first two weeks of June this year, a Traditional Life Skills Workshop was held on the banks of the Yellowknife River. This Workshop was part of the **Take a Kid Trapping Program** and involved over 100 students from the Kalemi Dene School in N'Dilo, Kaw Tay Whee School in Dettah, Yellowknife's William McDonald Middle School and Sir John Franklin High School. Students were given hands-on experience in moose hide tanning, playing Dene games and fish smoking. The riverside exposure was also the perfect place for building the Workshop's main attraction – a birch bark canoe.

For Aboriginal people of the Northwest Territories, trapping is a way of life – one that reflects generations of culture, tradition and a proud history of self-reliance and self-sufficiency. Built on the practice of passing on knowledge to the next generation, the Take a Kid Trapping Program is a component of the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur Program. It is a basic introduction to time honoured methods of trapping and harvesting wild furs and key elements of the traditional Aboriginal lifestyle. Guy Erasmus, of ITI, oversees the Take a Kid Trapping Program. He was also instrumental in the development stages. Guy explained that the Program is designed for young people of all ages. Canoe building is just one of many traditional life skills projects provided annually for school age youth across the NWT by ITI under the Take a Kid Trapping Program.

The Program (in partnership with the Departments of Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA) and Environment and Natural Resources (ENR)

is administered through ITI and delivered by schools and Aboriginal organizations. Elders are encouraged to pass on traditional skills such as trapping, hunting, fishing, moose hide tanning, preparing traditional food and other on-the-land life skills. Instructors, selected for their expertise, incorporate visits to trap lines and hands on experience setting traps, snares and fishnets; teach traditional life skills; and teach conservation and best practices in the preparation of pelts for market. Students can also learn snowshoeing, the history of trapping and the fur industry, trapping regulations, outdoor survival, emergency first aid and bear safety. Other organizations contribute to the success of this Program. St. John's Ambulance conducts classes in first aid for interested participants. These classes are funded by the Workers' Safety and Compensation Commission, and Transport Canada provides boat safety presentations.

When asked about the Program, Guy said, "It is vital to our culture's survival. This Program is an opportunity to experience the land as past generations did, and learn how to live as they did. I'm proud to be a part of it. "

Guy would like to thank the regional staff of MACA, ENR and ITI for their contributions to making this Program a success. It should be noted that, since 2002, over 4,000 young people have participated in this Program.

FEATURED ARTIST: CHRIS BROWN, Airbrush Artist



Chris Brown, born in Penzance, England, moved to Yellowknife in 1981, and has been enjoying the north ever since!

Chris has always had an interest in art, even at an early age. In 2005, while watching a popular show on TV called Orange County Choppers, he saw them painting a motorcycle with an airbrush and thought "I could do that". So he bought an airbrush, ordered some paint and started painting. Six months later, Chris got his first motorcycle to paint, and the work started to pile in.

In 2006, he took a job at Baker Boyz Designs in Edmonton as a full time airbrush artist, after a few months and getting a good following in Alberta, Chris moved back to Yellowknife to continue painting.

Chris currently has his artwork on bikes showing in Vegas, California, San Antonio, and all across Canada, many taking "best paint" awards at various shows. He does paintwork for shops from Calgary, Ottawa, Fort McMurray, Edmonton, and Saskatchewan.

Last year Chris was one of two Canadian artists chosen to paint a flag originating from the US Military. Seventeen artists were each chosen to paint a mural on the flag which was then sent to the troops in Khandahar, Afghanistan to hang at the base.

Chris has mainly painted motorcycles, snowmobiles, vehicles, and other items, some odd but always interesting, detailed and intricate. He signs every piece of artwork with a bear paw, which has now become his well known signature. Chris continues to explore and thrive in his airbrush art and is now venturing in to canvas art and is excited to see where this new undertaking takes his creative process.
