Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur (GMVF) Trapper Recognition Program awarded special recognition to Robert Kochon of Colville Lake NWT. Robert has attained highest level of fur sales through the GMVF program for the last three years. Robert's award included a trip to Fur Harvesters Auction annual Trapper's Convention March 28th, 29th, 2008 in North Bay Ontario.

Robert said he enjoyed visiting the various trapping display booths at the convention including skinning and pelthandling competitions. Robert has trapped all of his life and said he picked up some new tips and different techniques to try when he gets back home.

Robert, who produces 200 to 300 or so marten annually, lives in the bush and traps with his wife and 11 children from September to December each year.

"I have been trapping my whole life," Robert said. He is teaching his children, seven boys and four girls from five months to 18 years old, the skill of trapping just as his parents taught him. Robert mentioned that he observed how to better prepare skins by not over-stretching them.

"They do it the way it is supposed to be done for auction. It produces a better quality fur and we will be able to make more money," he said.
