GETTING HERE

Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway

The Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway celebrated its official opening in November 2017 and road-travellers can now venture all the way to Tuktoyaktuk and the Arctic Ocean. This is the only public highway to the Arctic Ocean in North America and it now connects Canada from sea, to sea, to sea.

The highway is truly beautiful to drive and the landscape varies by season. Enjoy the vast white frozen tundra in the winter dotted only by the occasional sighting of a red fox or other wildlife, the sun shimmering down on the crystal lakes in the summer time, and the colorful arctic shrub and berries in the fall.

As a new highway, there will be ongoing maintenance. The highway is surfaced with gravel and travellers should be prepared for rough, muddy and dusty sections as well as delays due to construction or maintenance. Travellers should check for road conditions before heading out.

You can also drop by the Visitor Centres in Dawson City and Inuvik before heading on the Dempster Highway or Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway to get the most recent traveller updates.

Are there roadside pull-outs along the Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway? Can I overnight my RV?

There are several pull outs along the highway at various points. These are unserviced rest areas and are not suitable for overnighting in an RV.

Is the highway patrolled?

The Territorial Government's Department of Infrastructure does patrols along the Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway. There are sections where cell phone service is not available. Carry a spot or in-reach device when travelling on remote highways.

Is there shuttle service between Inuvik and Tuktoyaktuk?

There is no regularly scheduled transit service but there are taxis in both Inuvik and Tuktoyaktuk where you can book a trip.

STAYING HERE

Camping in Tuktoyaktuk

Overnight parking for RVs and campers is available in Tuktoyaktuk at The Point. Please note that there are no power or water hookups at this location so ensure that your RV is prepared to be self-contained during your visit.

The fees are:

- \$30/night for a camper or RV
- \$20/night for a truck, car or tent

Payment can be made Mon - Fri, 9 am - 5 pm, at the Hamlet of Tuktoyaktuk's office (Visa, debit, or cash accepted). After hours 5 pm - 7 pm and weekends, payment can be made at the Visitor Information Centre (cash only).

Camping in Inuvik

The nearest campgrounds to Tuktoyaktuk with power and water hookups are Happy Valley Territorial Park and Jàk Territorial Park. These parks are located near Inuvik, a two hour drive from Tuktoyaktuk.

PINGOS

If you're travelling to Tuktoyaktuk, one of the must-sees are the pingos!

The Pingo Canadian Landmark is a natural area managed by Parks Canada. The Landmark protects eight of the 1,350 pingos scattered around the Tuktoyaktuk Peninsula. Of the eight protected, is Canada's highest and the world's second tallest pingo - Ibyuk Pingo. It reaches 49 metres in height and 300 metres across its base. The Tuktoyaktuk Peninsula includes one quarter of the world's pingos and is the most unusual landscapes in Canada.

What is a Pingo?

Pingos are ice-cored hills created when water within the sediments of a drained lake is forced to move upward when it freezes due to the permafrost around it. The word 'pingo' is an English version of the Inuvialuktun work 'pingu' which means 'hill'. Inuvialuit and their Thule ancestors have used them as navigational landmarks ('nakataq') or lookouts ('nasisaqturvik') to scan the surrounding area for game, whales, ice conditions or human travellers.

Parks Canada Invites You!

Five kilometres before Tuktoyaktuk - on the Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway, stop at the newly built viewing platform and enjoy a sweeping view of the area around the landmark. Interpretive panels provide insight on various aspects such as traditional use, formation, and significance of the area. Continue travelling north and you will come to the Pingo Canadian Landmark Day

Use Area. This area is a great place for a picnic to enjoy the view or launch your small watercraft.

A short 30-45 minute paddle in a sheltered inlet brings visitors to the 400-metre-long pingo viewing boardwalk. Starting with a floating dock suitable for motorboats and paddle craft, the boardwalk gently slopes uphill above the tundra bringing you to a deck with seating that offers a panoramic view of Ibyuk and Split pingos. On a clear day numerous other pingos dot the distant landscape. Pack binoculars and a lunch then settle in to enjoy the view.

Ways to Access the Pingo Viewing Boardwalk:

- Bring your own equipment or rent a paddle craft from local outfitters.
- Take a tour from Tuktoyaktuk: Some local outfitters are equipped to bring groups by motorboat to the Pingo Viewing Boardwalk or offer flightseeing tours and often package the tour with other interesting activities and sights.

Avoid Environmental Impacts

Although it looks tempting, hiking on the pingos is restricted between May and September. A few people can make a big impact on the Arctic tundra — paths are created in less than a week of use and regrowth is extremely slow, often exceeding 50 years. The vegetation on the pingos protect them from melting, exposure of black soil or ice increases the degradation and leads to pingo collapse.

Motorized vehicles increase compaction of the soil and the reduction of vegetation growth which accelerates erosion rates. At no point from May to September are motorized land vehicles (for example ATVs and snowmobiles) allowed in the Pingo Canadian Landmark due to the impacts on the land. During the winter months general access is allowed to the entire Pingo Canadian Landmark.
