## Indigenous Languages

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## Overview

The 2024 Parks Season Highlights show visits and tourism trends for Territorial Parks<sup>1</sup>. This season saw an increase in overnight stays at parks closer to big towns and cities. There were more visitors from within the Northwest Territories (NWT) compared to international ones. 2024 continued with post-pandemic recovery. The number of visitors increased compared to 2023, as wildfires affected the 2023 season.

## NWT Parks Overnight Visitors

The total number of overnight visitors to NWT parks increased by 8% from the 2023 to 2024 season. Overnight visitors are measured by the total number of nights each visitor stayed in a territorial park.



Overnight stays across all regions were, on average, 12% lower. However, in 2024, overall visitation increased by 8% compared to 2023. Visitation declined at the regional level, particularly in the Beaufort Delta, Dehcho, and South Slave. The North Slave region, however, more than made up for these losses, with 51,508 overnight stays—almost reaching its five-year peak of 54,674. There were mass cancellations in 2023 due to park closures from wildfires. This surge was

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<sup>1</sup> **Key Indicators and Notes:** The Research and Planning Unit within the Tourism and Parks Division compiles and reports key statistics from NWT Parks. In 2024, NWT Parks introduced new reservation software with more robust reporting capabilities and as a result this season's datasets and report figures include information not available in previous years. To provide a comparative analysis, all values from previous years reports were updated to correlate with the improved data sets from this season's new software. Annual visitor data from 2020-2023 was updated to include the average length of stay, allowing for a more accurate comparison with the new 2024 data. Prior to 2024, overnight visitor totals were based solely on reservations and party size; this season, the number of nights in each reservation is also accounted for. Updates to the 2020-2023 season's data may introduce minor error into the figures.

followed by a rebound to normal levels in 2024. Additionally, the opening of a new campground this season may have contributed to the rise in visitation. Overall, visitation across all regions are moving back toward pre-pandemic levels.

## NWT Park Visitor Origin

Overnight visitors from within the NWT increased 51%, from 34,956 in 2023 to 52,916 this season. This increase offset the 30% decline in visitors from outside the territory. Visits from outside the NWT dropped from 39,294 visitors in 2023 to 27,554 in 2024. The reduction in out of territory visitors is likely from intermittent highway closures because of persistent wildfires at the NWT/AB border.



## Annual Visitor Origin



Visitor origin trends differ across regions. Most regions show an even mix of resident visitors and out-of-territory tourists. The North Slave region stands out with 85% of visitors originating from within the territory. Most visits are to parks near the capital city of Yellowknife. All regions experienced an increase in resident visitors this season. There was a decline in visitors from other parts of Canada compared to the 2023 season. Visitation from the USA remained consistent across most regions. Only the Dehcho region reported a 5% decrease in American tourists compared to last year.



## Overnight Visitors by Park

Some parks experienced significant increases in visitation, while others saw similar decreases. There was an overall 8% increase across all parks. The parks with the highest occupancy compared to 2023 were Reid Lake, Prelude Lake, and Queen Elizabeth Territorial Parks. Visitation increases ranged from 48% to 122%.

The increase in visitation is likely due to two factors:

- These parks have a high concentration of local visitors;
- Record lows in 2023 were caused the cancellation of all reservations from August and September due to wildfires.

The rebound to above normal levels is extraordinary.

The Beaufort Delta experienced some of the steepest declines in visitation. The average drop is -63% when compared to 2023. The region typically sees high occupancy from out-of-territory and international visitors. There are a combination of operational and travel access issues—particularly the availability of park services and the poor condition of the Dempster Highway—that could be contributing factors to the lower occupancy.

Highway closures due to persistent wildfires in 2024 likely caused lower visitation at most South Slave and Dehcho parks. The decline in visitation at Twin Falls can also be partly attributed to the closure of the 12 campsites at Escarpment Creek Campground due to wildfire damage.

The average length of stay in the NWT parks was 2.29—a decrease in the average length of stay during the 2023 season. The COVID-19 pandemic saw an increase in length of stay to above three nights per visitor. In 2024, this figure has gradually returned to pre-pandemic norms.
